A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

True words are not beautiful. Beautiful words are not true. — Lao-tzu

How negotiable is a fact? Are any facts negotiable? If so, which ones and who decides?

John D'Agata is a real-life author who wrote a real-life essay about a real-life teenager who committed suicide in Las Vegas. The essay was then fact-checked by a real-life fact-checker named Jim Fingal. What resulted from that assignment was a wealth of arguments, negotiations, and revisions as the two struggled to navigate the boundaries of "truth and accuracy and whether it is appropriate for a writer to substitute one for the other."

So, in 2012 they wrote a book about their experience. In a way. Whereas the argument in the book is partially about the "shaping" that's necessary in all art forms, D'Agata and Fingal recreated some of their exchanges, completely fabricated others, and cast themselves as two characters that were loosely based on them but were not *actually* them. As a result, the book touched a nerve in literary and journalistic circles and those who like to argue about ethics in art.

One Sunday morning, playwright David Murrell read the passionately negative *New York Times* review of the book. "It just struck me—this is classic—this is a play right here," and reached out to his frequent collaborator, Jeremy Kareken. Fittingly, the playwrights were free to draw inspiration from the book but were not bound by it. "We have no responsibility to the real people involved," said Murrell. "The book is a tower of confabulations embellishment and imagination atop embellishment and imagination. This play is the latest iteration of that." After a six-year development process, Gordon Farrell joined the team as it prepared to open on Broadway in 2018.

This play wants you to grapple with dichotomies. Between fact and fiction, youth and experience, desert and the city, Manhattan, and Vegas, black and white. Between those entrenched in technology and the old guard holding onto positions of power. It is these opposites that invite the ridiculous and give us permission to laugh at the absurdity of where we find ourselves.

In the age of the internet and the backdrop of fake news, we can obtain essentially any information we seek. Information is literally at our fingertips, and yet it is harder than ever to know what is actually real. As a society, we grant ourselves license to curate facts to shape the stories we present to the world. Our news stories, art, literature, movies, and social media all present a different version of the truth, supported by varying degrees of fact. Our culture seems to have an unspoken code for blurring the line between fact and fiction, but at what point do we lose the ability to decipher between the two? Some of the characters in this play might argue that this is an instance when asking the question is more important than knowing the answer.

I think it is right that this thoughtful and funny play kicks off Curious' 24th season as it homes in at the very nature of truth, fact, and storytelling.

It is an honor to give this play to you.

Chip Walton (Producing Artistic Director) co-founded Curious Theatre Company in 1997 and has served as Producing Artistic Director for the entire history of the organization. Named Denver's "2005 Theatre Person of the Year," he has directed more than fifty shows for Curious over the past 24 years and his work has garnered more than 100 local and national awards. In 2008, Curious was honored with the Mayor's Award for Excellence in the Arts. Chip has served as the President and Vice President of the National New Play Network, a network of professional, non-profit theatres across the country dedicated to the development and production of new plays for the American theatre. Chip was also selected in the inaugural class of the Bonfils-Stanton Foundation Livingston Fellows, recognizing exceptional non-profit leaders with significant potential for contribution, change and leadership in Colorado's nonprofit sector; additionally, he served on the Board of Directors of the Bonfils-Stanton Foundation as their first Community Trustee. Chip has participated in the Visiting Professionals program at the Eugene O'Neill Theatre Center, as well as serving on the Leadership Group for Imagine 2020: Creating a Future for Denver's Culture. He has directed in the National New Play Network Showcase of New Plays, the Kennedy Center's MFA Playwriting Festival in Washington, D.C., and accepted a National Theatre Company Award in New York for Curious from the prestigious American Theatre Wing. Most recently, Chip was honored to serve as a 2017 Aspen Ideas Festival Speaker.
