Erik Sandvold (Benjamin Franklin) marks his 24th full production with Curious over these 25 meaningful years with *Franklinland*—in addition to appearances in many staged readings, Denver Stories, Curious New Voices plays, and development workshops.

Award-winning roles with Curious include Mason Marzac in *Take Me Out*, Tom in *Lucky Me*, Milton in *Homebody/ Kabul*, and all 36 characters in *I Am My Own Wife*. Other favorite Curious experiences include: *Refuge, Pass Over, Your Best One, The Luckiest People, Clybourne Park, Opus, Fuddy Meers*, and *Closer*. Erik's other credits feature: *Plainsong, When We Are Married, Well* (Denver Center Theatre Company); *Arsenic and Old Lace, 1940's Radio Hour* (Arvada Center); *Twelfth Night, The Rivals* (CSF); *The Explorers' Club* (Lone Tree); *An Iliad* (Theatreworks); *The Rembrandt* (BETC); and *Bubs* (Denver Post Ovation Award, Best Solo Performance). He narrated all the Harry Potter books for The Library of Congress, along with about a thousand others, is a Boulder native, and an alumnus of Northwestern University.

Danté J. Finley (William Temple Franklin) is very pleased to be making their Denver main stage debut with Curious Theatre. A native of La Junta, Colorado, where they first fell in love with theatre many years ago. Their most recent credits are primarily with

Theatreworks of Colorado Springs in productions such as *Twelfth Night, A Midsummers Night Dream, House Arrest,* and *Comedy of Errors.* Other credits include *The Totalitarians* (Springs Ensemble Theatre), *Short Eyes* (Theatre d'Art), and *Dog Sees God* (Funky Little Theatre).

Lloyd Suh (Playwright) is the author of *The Chinese Lady* (recently produced with Ma-Yi at the Public Theater), Bina's *Six Apples* (Alliance Theatre and Children's Theatre Company), Charles Francis Chan Jr.'s *Exotic Oriental Murder Mystery, The Wong Kids in the Secret of the Space Chupacabra Go!, Franklinland, Jesus in India*, and many more, including *The Far Country*, which will premiere at Atlantic Theater Company in December, and *The Heart Sellers*, which will premiere at Milwaukee Rep in February. His work has been produced at theaters across the country including Ensemble Studio Theatre, Magic Theatre, Denver Center, Artists Rep, Interact, Geva, Timeline, the Guthrie with Theater Mu, ArtsEmerson, Long Wharf and others, and internationally at the Cultural Center of

the Philippines and with PCPA at the Guerilla Theatre in Seoul, Korea. He has received a Guggenheim Fellowship, the Herb Alpert Award in the Arts, the Horton Foote Prize, the Helen Merrill Award, and the Lilah Kan Red Socks Award. He served from 2005–10 as the Artistic Director of Second Generation and Co-Director of the Ma-Yi Writers Lab, and from 2011–20 as Director of Artistic Programs at The Lark. He was elected in 2016 to the Dramatists Guild Council.

**Dee Covington** (Director) is a founding member of Curious Theatre Company. Over the past 24 years she has garnered awards for her work as an actor and director. Dee's select directing credits at Curious include Refuge, The Thanksgiving Play, The Humans, Your Best One, Hand to God, the three-part The Brother/Sister Plays, Collapse, Dead Man's Cell Phone, Speech & Debate, and The Denver *Project.* As an actress she most recently participated in the development of a new play by Max Posner (Curious New Voices alum) during the Colorado New Play Festival. At Curious, representative roles include Claire in Sanctions, Empty in *The Intelligent Homosexual's Guide....*, Toni in Appropriate, Roz in White Guy on the Bus, Margaret in Good People, Veronica in God of Carnage, Bev/Kathy in Clybourne Park, and The Homebody in Homebody/Kabul. She is also a longtime member of the improvisational theatre company, Playback Theatre West; a theatre form that spontaneously builds community one story at a time. Dee has spent the last three decades fostering the creative process in adults and teenagers. Serving as Education Director for Curious Theatre Company, she facilitates all aspects of Curious New Voices programming, including all playwriting intensives. Most recently she has joined the University of Denver Prison Arts Initiative (DU PAI) where she has been involved in teaching theatre and writing classes.

Markas Henry (Scenic & Costume Design) is honored to be the Artist-in-Residence as Scenic Designer for Curious' entire 25th season. In previous seasons, he has designed scenery for Refuge, American Son, Sanctions, The Humans, The Intelligent Homosexual's Guide..., Appropriate, the three-part Elliot Plays, Lucky Me, All the Rage, The Whipping Man (Colorado Theatre Guild Henry Award), After the Revolution, God of Carnage, Maple and Vine, and Opus; as well as costumes for White Guy on the Bus, The Whipping Man, Time Stands Still, Dead Man's Cell Phone, and Mall\*Mart. His selected regional credits include Theatre Aspen, Opera Colorado, Colorado Shakespeare Festival, and BETC. Broadway credits include *Thoroughly* Modern Millie (Tony Award), The Life (Tony nomination) and Beauty and the Beast (Tony Award). His film work includes Elf and Leading Ladies, and he was Costume Producer for Britney Spears' 2001 and 2004 US and World tours. Markas is an Associate Professor of Theatre at the University of Colorado Boulder.

Vance McKenzie (Lighting Design) is a freelance lighting designer designing his first show for Curious Theatre. He is the resident lighting designer at Miners Alley. Recent designs include *Hair* for Miner's Alley Playhouse, *Once On This Island* at Town Hall Arts Center and *Cinderella* for Candlelight Dinner Playhouse. Other designs include: *The Foreigner, White Christmas*, and *She Loves Me* at the Arvada Center, *Clue* for Little Theatre of the Rockies, *Fairfield, District Merchants* and *Once* at Miner's Alley Playhouse, *Mama Mia, Sister Act* and *Ghost* for Lake Dillon Theater Company and *Jekyll and Hyde* at Candlelight Dinner Playhouse.

## BIOS

Brian Freeland (Sound Design) marks his 35th design with Curious Theatre Company with Franklinland. Past productions over the last 25 years for Curious have included Bug, I Am My Own Wife, Lieutenant of Inishmore, Curse of the Starving Class, 9 Parts of Desire, Eurydice, Opus, Homebody/Kabul, Dead Man's Cell Phone, The Elaborate Entrance of Chad Deity, The Elliot Plays, The Whipping Man, iHo, and Fireflies (with CeCe Smith). He is an 8 time Henry Award nominee, 8 time Denver Post Ovation Award nominee and Westword Mastermind Award recipient for his sound and projection work.

Annette Westerby (Props Design) is an Artistic Company member who has contributed to over 20 Curious Theatre Company productions. She created the blood effects and trained a cat for *Lieutenant of Inishmore*, obtained the live sheep for *Curse of the Starving Class*, made Elvis and Jesus costumes for *End Days*, painted 50 matching violins for *Opus*, created props and smoke effects for *Homebody/Kabul*, and designed the props and costumes for *Red*. Annette returned to Denver in 2021 after years living in Brooklyn and LA. In New York, she designed several Off-Off-Broadway productions and was a studio sewing assistant to artist Marie Watt.

Wayne Breyer (Stage Manager) is stage managing his third show with Curious. Previously with Curious, he stage managed *Heroes of the Fourth Turning* and the world premiere of *Refuge*. Other stage management credits: *Public Domain Theatre Festival, Eddie and Dave, Land of Milk and Honey, The Whiskey Tasting, The Rough, Shockheaded Peter, and Everybody* (The Catamounts); *Queens Girl in the World and The Music of Black Nativity* (Aurora Fox Arts Center); *Recipe* (Theater Artibus); and the 2019 Colorado New Play Festival. He is also a properties designer and has designed

for Curious, The Catamounts, Phamaly Theatre Company, and Vintage Theatre. Wayne trained as an apprentice stage manager with the Denver Center Theatre Company and is an associate company member of The Catamounts.
